FROM YOUR PARISH PRIEST

Now that we have examined the Jewish roots of the Mass, the liturgy of the Word and the liturgy of the Eucharist, let us turn our attention to some of the sacred vestments that are used in the rites. As mentioned previously, the priest does not celebrate the liturgy in his own clothes because at this point he is not acting as himself, rather it is Christ who celebrates the liturgy through the priest and so vestments are worn to cover him and invite us to a deeper understanding of what is going on during the Mass.

The first vestment that the priest puts on over his cassock is called the *amice*, this is a rectangular cloth that is tucked into the collar and secured around the waist by tapes. This item not only helps to cover the priest's ordinary clothes but is a reminder of the helmet of salvation and the cloth used by Veronica to wipe the face our of Lord on his way to the cross. The next vestment is known as the *alb*, this is the long white garment that covers the cassock and is a symbol of the purity of heart that the priest must bring to the altar in order to offer the Holy Sacrifice. Next comes the *cincture*, this rope-like cord again is a symbol of purity. The *stole* is next placed over the *alb* and secured in place by the *cincture*, the *stole* is the long vestment that resembles a scarf. This represents priestly power and authority and can trace its roots back to the clothes worn by judges and senators in ancient Rome. Next, although optional these days, is the *maniple*, this is a small piece of cloth that is draped over the priest's left arm, which again has a twofold meaning. The *maniple* was once a very practical garment used for wiping the priest's brow while celebrating Mass in hot climates but is also reminiscent of a waiter's towel, draped over the arm to remind the priest that he is here to serve. Finally, the *chasuble* is the large, coloured vestment that is placed on top of all the others. This reminds the priest of the charity of Christ: "Over all these virtues put on love, which binds the rest together and makes them perfect" (Colossians, 3:14).

In the Middle Ages, two popular interpretations of the meaning of the vestments arose. The most prevalent one interpreted the vestments as symbols of Jesus' passion: the blindfold (the amice) and the garment (the alb) as he was mocked and beaten; the ropes and fetters (the cincture) which bound him during the scourging; the cross (the stole) he carried; and the seamless garment (the chasuble) for which the soldiers rolled dice. The other popular interpretation focused on the vestments in their Roman military origins and viewed them as symbols of the priest as the soldier of Christ doing battle against sin and Satan on behalf of the people.

In all, the vestments used at Mass have a two-fold purpose: "These should therefore symbolise the function of each ministry, but at the same time the vestments should also contribute to the beauty of the rite" (General Instruction on the Roman Missal, #335). Moreover, the vestments ought to inspire the priest and all of the faithful to meditate on their rich symbolism and help raise our hearts and minds to God. There is always a meaning and an explanation behind everything that we do and use in church, nothing is here by chance – if you ever have any questions about these things, just ask me and I will be happy to explain – if I know the answer!
