FROM YOUR PARISH PRIEST

A few people have asked me now, about the small brass display cases that appear on the altar of from time to time. They stand next to the candles and have little glass windows on the front. They were on the altar on Ascension Thursday and will be on there again on the feast of Pentecost. So what are they? Well the answer is that they are *reliquaries*, that is to say, they are display cases for the relics of saints. In this case on our altar, one contains a fragment of bone from St Theresa of Avila and the other contains a fragment of bone from St John of the Cross and are brought out on special occasions. So... relics... what's going on there?

Keeping and displaying the relics of the saints is a precious part of our Catholic tradition and as usual, like most things these days, is generally misunderstood. Many non-Catholics particularly shy away from the sacramental aspects of Catholicism—and not from the seven sacraments only. What they dislike is the mixing of spirit and matter, the gift of something spiritual—grace—by means of physical ordinary things. In the sacraments, common material things such as water, wine, bread, oil, and the imposition of hands result in the giving of grace. Related to the sacraments are the sacramentals, objects such as medals, blessed palms, holy water, and ashes etc. Their use can lead people to receive or respond to grace. But one of the biggest problems for non-Catholics are the relics of saints—the bones, blood, clothing, or personal possessions of the saints that are held in reverence by the Church and sometimes associated with miraculous healings and other acts of God.

The veneration of relics is seen explicitly as early as the account of St Polycarp's martyrdom written by the Smyrnaeans in A.D. 156. In it, the Christians describe the events following his burning at the stake: "We took up his bones, which are more valuable than precious stones and finer than refined gold, and laid them in a suitable place, where the Lord will permit us to gather ourselves together, as we are able, in gladness and joy and to celebrate the birthday of his martyrdom." Throughout history relics have been a source of miraculous healing, inspiration of faith, and advancement of the Kingdom. These miracles have been documented, even beginning in the scriptures. Moses carried the bones of Joseph out of Egypt (Ex. 13:19). Men placed a dead man into the tomb of Eliesus and the dead man came to life (2 Kings 13:21). People touched cloth to St. Paul's hands. Then, they touched that cloth to the sick. They were healed (Acts 19:11).

For Catholics, the relics of the saints are similar to keep sakes from family members who have gone before us. I remember a lady in my first parish who always wore a locket containing a lock of her son's hair who had died in a car crash. There was no question of that seeming morbid, but a precious reminder of her child and a way for her to feel close to him wherever she was. The displaying of relics is a bit like putting out family photographs on the sideboard, wearing the jewellery that our mother left us or cherishing a family heirloom that has been handed down.

Since the beginning, the Church has upheld the practice of venerating relics. This veneration is not offering adoration or worship which is due only to God. Veneration is the honouring, cherishing, respecting, and devotion of heart given to the saints. Veneration is an expression of our friendship and love for the saints – our brothers and sisters in heaven. This veneration flows from our admiration of the saint's holy life and our desire to be united with them in God's Kingdom. Hope that helps.
