CRY ROOM AT ST MARY'S

I realise that when children in Mass at St Mary's are feeling a little restless that there is nowhere parents can take them to calm down. As such, I have asked a few parishioners to help me in clearing out the back room of church (where the staircase is) so that it can become a place where children can go during Mass if they are becoming uncomfortable in church. In order to make the room as welcoming as possible I was wondering if people might be able to donate <u>children's bibles</u>, religious books, Noah's Ark type toys, <u>colouring pencils</u> etc. and anything else that you think might make the space suitable for children. I'd be very grateful.

FROM YOUR PARISH PRIEST

During my first appointment as a curate in Leeds my parish was just across the road from Saint Gemma's Hospice and so I was regularly called out at all hours to visit to the dying, and to administer the last rites to them. One occasion that stays with me very clearly, was when I was asked to go and visit an elderly lady who had only a few days left to live and had asked for Holy Communion. Over the next 48 hours, I visited her several times, not only because she did not have any family of which to speak, but also because she was such wonderful company. She was in many ways a very ordinary person, she had had a secretarial job in Leeds, she had never married and told me that by this point, most of her friends had died and yet I cannot ever remember meeting somebody as content or as cheerful as she was. When I asked this devout lady about her happiness, in the face of what was a very difficult situation, she smiled, and told me that she loved God, and that was all she ever needed and wanted nothing more. I sat with her until the end and after she had died I went home touched and moved by the whole experience, but also jealous of her depth of faith and serenity.

Last Monday, the church celebrated the feast day of Saint Augustine of Hippo, who was born in the year 354 in Thagaste in North Africa. Saint Augustine is one of who we call the "Fathers of the Church" - These were ancient and influential Christian theologians and writers who established the intellectual and doctrinal foundations of our religion. The historical period in which they worked became known as the Patristic Era and ran all the way (approximately) from the late 1st to mid-8th centuries.

Saint Augustine, over the course of his life wrote vast works of theology and apologetics. One of the most famous lines from his work *The Confessions*, reads "You have made us for Yourself, O Lord, and our hearts are restless until they rest in You". Restlessness is that desire to be filled and fulfilled. We all have it. We try to ignore at times, but still it remains.

As human beings who have been created in God's image and likeness, our souls naturally yearn for union with Him. Most people these days are unaware of this reality or actively seek to avoid it but like it or not, the human soul is like a sunflower that tracks the Sun across the sky, we are hardwired to seek God out in order to flourish and find that fulfilment.

There is great restlessness in our world today because so many of us are searching for happiness and contentment and looking in all the wrong places. Look at the our political leaders, how they grapple for power and influence. Look at celebrities who crave fame and material wealth. Look at social media and how people beg for attention and affirmation from people they have never met and never will. Then I think of Cecilia in the hospice, who had no power or influence, who was not famous, or rich, and certainly had no interest in the attention of other people, and yet died with a gentle smile on her face, satisfied and fulfilled because her heart was resting in God.

What was true for Saint Augustine 1600 years ago remains true today, the only two realities from which we can never escape are God and ourselves, and the two come as a package, neither can be known without the other. If our hearts can find rest in God, then all the cares of the world are put into perspective and find their proper place. A successful career, a big pension, a nice house, a fancy car, being president of the club, all of these things are nice, but ultimately worthless in our final hours. I'm still inspired by those few days in the hospice and I hope and pray that one day I might know God as well and as deeply as Cecilia did, because she really had it all.
