FROM YOUR PARISH PRIEST

As we all know, the three spiritual weapons at our disposal over the course of the season of Lent are prayer, fasting and almsgiving. We are usually pretty good at prayer, and we all usually try and give something up, but almsgiving, the traditional third form of penance in the Christian life is often neglected. This is unfortunate, because giving alms is a powerful way to grow in holiness. Catholic writer Scott Hahn even goes as far as saying that almsgiving is superior to prayer and fasting, because as he put it, giving alms includes both prayer and fasting, and surpasses them.

Jesus gives us a clear mandate to give alms (Mark 6, Luke 12). Strictly speaking, almsgiving means giving financially or materially to someone in need. In a broader sense, almsgiving refers to acts of mercy, covering both the spiritual and corporal works of mercy. The fact that God blesses those who help the poor and needy is clear throughout the scriptures. Giving alms purifies us and helps us grow in virtue, particularly those of charity, mercy and generosity. It must become more than us fumbling for change when encountering a homeless person, and certainly far more than just a nice, pious thought. Think about it: If we see a homeless man on the street, does it make sense to wish him well or would it make more sense to ask if the man would like some food to eat (see James 2:14-16)?

I am sure that many of you already give to charities throughout the year as it is, but there is something significant about a parish raising money together for a specific cause over this holy season. As I mentioned in the Lenten leaflet that you received last week, this year we will be collecting money for *Aid to the Church in Need*. I suggest that you keep an envelope or bag at home to collect your offerings over the next few weeks, which can then be presented during the offertory procession on Holy (Maundy) Thursday.

Aid to the Church in Need is a Pontifical foundation of the Church which supports Catholics around the world who are persecuted, oppressed or in pastoral need. Each year they fund over 5,000 projects in more than 140 countries around world, helping to support the Church in its mission, and bringing hope and solidarity to millions of people. From priests to catechists and seminarians to Sisters, donations enable them to help persecuted and suffering Christians live out their faith. By helping these key Church leaders, they are actually reaching out to many more of our brothers and sisters – millions in fact, as the projects that they support have the specific aim of providing pastoral and spiritual support to Christians in parishes and communities all over the world.

ACN does fantastic work in Pakistan, for example, where every year up to 1,000 Christian and Hindu women and girls aged between 12 and 25 are abducted, forced to convert to Islam and marry. Christians in Pakistan often struggle to find work due to discrimination and frequently become destitute. Many Catholics work in brick kilns and become trapped in a cycle of bonded labour, essentially modern slavery. They face the impossible task of repaying loans taken out to buy food and other basic necessities. Discriminated against and under constant pressure to convert, never are the faithful in Pakistan ashamed to be Christian. Let's offer whatever we can to help them. They are being tested in faith and we are being tested in love.
