FROM YOUR PARISH PRIEST

I don't tend to like connecting my piece in the bulletin to the Gospel on Sunday because I like to keep the sermon on a different theme, but this week there is a connection that I cannot help but make. Today's Gospel is all about our Lord cleansing the Temple in Jerusalem and chasing the moneychangers out with a whip that He had made from cord because they had desecrated the sacred space. As I was reading the newspaper last week, this image of the Lord's house being defiled was brought into sharp relief by something I noticed.

On the 9th of February, Canterbury Cathedral hosted a "silent disco", an event where people dance to music they hear on wireless headphones rather than on speakers. Around 2000 people attended "the rave in the nave" and can be seen on video clips dancing, and swigging beer and vodka as lights flashed all around them. All of this happened in the church where St Thomas Becket was martyred in 1170, the church which was founded by St Augustine when he brought Christianity to this land and seemingly the Cathedral authorities thought that this was just fine.

The Anglican dean of the Cathedral, Dr. David Monteith, was quoted as saying, "Whether people choose to come to Canterbury Cathedral primarily as worshippers, sightseers, or attendees at our events—which include classical concerts, light and sound installations, and craft workshops—it's always joyous to see them discover this incredible place anew and on their own terms." ... What a load of absolute rubbish!

As Bishop Robert Barron commented: "The whole point, of course, is that cathedrals are not meant to be experienced "on our terms." They are meant to draw us out of ourselves into the contemplation of a higher world. They are designed to disorient us and to compel us to see things differently. When we allow a disco to take place inside a sacred space, we, quite literally, desecrate the place, we render it unholy, because "holy" literally means "set apart." The thousands upon thousands of pilgrims who came to the Canterbury Cathedral over the centuries to visit the tomb of St. Thomas Becket were seeking access to the mystical dimension that lies beyond this world. They came from the ordinary realm of shopping, farming, entertainment, and family, and they knew that they would return to that realm after their pilgrimage. But they also knew that the church was something else, something strange and alluring, and they most certainly did not want it transformed into farm fields or village streets or a bawdy dance hall."

The silent disco at Canterbury Cathedral speaks to us of the age in which we live, in which very little is still held to be sacred or sacrosanct. Let us never take our parish church for granted, this is God's House and we should treat it as such, it is holy, set apart and consecrated. St. John of Damascus said that prayer is "the raising of the mind and heart to God," and Lent as we know is, above all, a time of prayer. So let us, during this holy season, cultivate "sacred space" in our owns lives too; let us not permit the secular and the ordinary to dominate that space and give to God what belongs to Him.
