FROM YOUR PARISH PRIEST

I don't know if you'll have seen yet, the new series on the BBC of 'Pilgrimage', with this latest instalment entitled: *The Road Through North Wales*. If you haven't seen this programme before, the concept is simple, a group of (so-called) celebrities embark together on a pilgrimage to one of Europe's holy sites along famous and well established routes. Pervious series have included journeys to Santiago de Compostela and Rome. All of the 'celebrities' come from a mixture of different faiths and backgrounds and aim to see if the experience of pilgrimage will awaken any sort of spirituality within them or reconnect them to their beliefs. This new series takes a group on foot across north Wales along the 220km Pilgrim's Way. The route begins near St Winefride's Well and ends at Bardsey Island, on the tip of the Lleyn Peninsula. Fabled as the 'Island of 20,000 saints', Bardsey was once a popular destination for early Celtic monks, who believed it to be the end of the world.

I find these programmes absolutely fascinating to watch but at the same time also slightly depressing. The religious knowledge and literacy of the 'celebrities' is often shockingly poor, with one participant in this year's pilgrimage (who was schooled at Eton!) utterly astounded to learn that Jesus of Nazareth was indeed a historical figure and not a mythical character. The same person commented at the end of the pilgrimage that the experience made him less interested in thinking about God and more interested in self-development and finding self-fulfilment.

As we mark *Vocations Sunday* today, there is so much to be hopeful about, with the number of priests in the world at last count being around 407,872. But watching 'Pilgrimage' the other night, really brought home to me how much of a challenge we face in this part of the world. It is harder than ever, today, for young people to discern the voice of the Lord in their lives not only because there are so many distractions and draws on their attention but because the modern way of thinking about life and our purpose is so drastically disconnected from what has gone before. What was clear in the programme was that although all of the 'celebrities' seemed like thoroughly nice and decent people, they were at one level all deeply selfish and self-centred. They constantly spoke about themselves, their goals and priorities, their opinions and attitudes and most of all, were desperate to confirm themselves as the centre of their own universe.

This way of looking at life, based on self-belief is all-pervasive these days and is ultimately the antithesis of the Gospel message and what it is to be a Christian. The way that Jesus shows us, is not the path of self-promotion but of humility and of service to our brothers and sisters. "Anyone who loves their life will lose it, while anyone who hates their life in this world will keep it for eternal life" and "If anyone would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow me." People have forgotten that the measure of how full and happy our lives are depends on how open we are to God and His will. As St Augustine famously wrote "You have made us for yourself, O Lord, and our heart is restless until it rests in you." This is why Catholicism is so out-of-step and counter cultural at this time, because in order to live out our faith in its fullest expression, we must learn to constantly die to self.

The reason that so many dismiss the idea of a vocation to the priesthood today is their perception that it is a 'difficult life' and one of 'self-sacrifice', which of course on many levels it is. But exactly the same could be said of any marriage or of family life. The sacrifices that the priesthood entails are as nothing compared to the joy, fulfilment, comfort and love that we experience as clergy from the people that we serve and from the Church that we give our lives to. It is in giving of ourselves that we receive and, in all walks of life, that by placing God and others before ourselves and looking outwards, rather than inwards, that lasting joy, contentment and fulfilment are found.
