FROM YOUR PARISH PRIEST

One of the usual old lines that people like to wheel out when they criticise practices of the Church is... "That's not in the Bible". I cannot tell you the number of times that I've heard that old chestnut. This is because as Catholics we affirm the truth, that God's revelation, is contained both in the scriptures and in the Tradition of the Church. Tradition with a capital 'T'. This refers to the transmission of the faith through the apostolic succession, the Church's liturgy and her authoritative teaching. Holy Trinity, for example, two words that you will not find anywhere in the Bible, but something that we know to be true because it is a teaching revealed by God, contained within the Church's Tradition. I'll speak about the relationship between Scripture and Tradition another time.

One thing that people always seem to forget is that the Church existed before the Bible. The Bible as we know it today is a collection of the Hebrew scriptures and the New Testament writings, these later documents were written by members of the Church and were 'canonised' (put together and recognised as authentic) by the bishops who collated the Bible. Before the New Testament was written, the teachings of Our Lord were passed down orally by the Apostles and their followers. This oral tradition was the primary way that the early Church understood and spread the faith.

The books that would become the New Testament were written over several decades following Jesus' death and resurrection, with the earliest writings attributed to St Paul in the AD 50s. The process of determining which writings were authoritative (the canon) took centuries. The first list resembling the current New Testament canon was compiled by St Athanasius in AD 367, but it wasn't until the Councils of Hippo (AD 393) and Carthage (AD 397) that there was a more formal acceptance of this set of books. The Church played a crucial role in the recognition, collection, preservation, and dissemination of these texts. Without a defined canon, early Christians relied on the teachings passed down through the authority of bishops, who are the authentic successors to the apostles.

The canon of scripture as we know it today was formally defined at the Council of Trent in 1546 in response to the so-called 'reformation'. The council reaffirmed what had been accepted by the Church since Hippo and Carthage, that the Old Testament was made up of 46 books and the New Testament made up of 27 books. Upon separating himself from the Church, Martin Luther had taken issue with some of the books in the canon. These included 6/7 Old Testament books and parts of Esther and Daniel. He particularly disliked the book of Maccabees because of the text's emphasis on praying for the dead and offering sacrifices for them. Similarly, he took issue with the Letter of St James in the New Testament because it directly contradicts the protestant idea of salvation through faith alone.

It is important for us to remember that the worship of the early Church included practices such as the Eucharist, Baptism, and communal prayer, which were based on Our Lord's teachings and actions before any written New Testament existed. The Mass, for instance, was based on the Last Supper narrative, which was part of oral tradition long before being written down. Thus, the Church's existence predates the final compilation and widespread use of the Bible as we know it today, relying on oral tradition, the apostolic teachings, and the communal living out of the faith. The Bible, in this context, emerged from the Church rather than the Church from the Bible.

The assertion "That's not in the Bible!" misses the boarder scope of the Church's belief since the earliest times that both Scripture and Tradition are integral to understanding divine revelation. The Bible has been shaped by the Church's life, its councils and the discernment of the bishops across centauries. Realising this is crucial for a fuller appreciation of how the faith has been lived and taught from the very beginning and how we practice it today.
